1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Regular meetings are held in departments to review the adequacy and viability of the existing courses and the changes required to compete with the contemporary system. The existing programs are reviewed and new age programmes introduced to create better opportunities for students. Feedback from students, alumni, parents, academic peers and community are obtained for formulation and introduction of new courses. a) Students: A Performa based on NAAC recommendations has been designed to obtain feedback on curriculum. The Performa was sent to students by google forms online mode. b) Alumni: Alumnae Meet which is a regular feature provides a platform to its old students to participate in college activities and give their valuable suggestions on curriculum. c) Parents: The feedback on curriculum is obtained during the Parent-Teacher Meet organized to apprise the parents with the performance of their ward and obtain their feedback on the functioning of the college. During 2019-20, this feedback has also been taken by online mode from randomly selected parents. d) Industries: Industry academia meet is organised in which interaction with industry experts is held and industrial visits are organized for the students which provide an opportunity to interact with the industrial sector and obtain the inputs on the curriculum. e) Academic Peers: National seminars, conferences, workshops and extension lectures organized from time to time facilitate exchange of ideas with the peer group and update the faculty about the latest emerging trends. f) Community: Fairs, cultural programs, social outreach activities provide opportunity to interact with community and introduce need based programs. The feedback thus obtained is analyzed. In-house departmental meetings are held to review the courses and programmes. The Principal discusses the key findings with the Deans and Heads of the Departments. The changes recommended in various courses are tabled in Board of Studies meetings by the member teachers for appropriate inclusion. Resolutions adopted after consultations with Academic Council and Governing Body are communicated to the affiliating university. The feedback has been utilized in enriching the curriculum in the following manner: 1. The present syllabi of nearly all programmes are based on industry-market needs. 2. Students and Parents have recommended introducing post graduate programme M.Sc. Botany and under Graduate programme B.Sc.(Hons.) Maths during 2018-19 feedback, so M.Sc Botany and B.Sc. (Hons.) Maths have been introduced during 2019-20. 3. The students have recommended starting B.Sc. (Hons) Physics, B.Ed., Hotel Management, M.B.A.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The Institution is running student mentoring innovative program from last many years very successfully. Under this mentoring programme each student is provided with a mentor. The mentor takes care of academic, social, psychological and financial needs of the student. Mentoring booklets are provided to students and mentors to keep record of student activities, their academic growth, meeting record and progression/placement. Normally mentor mentees ratio is kept approximately 1:15. It is ensured that each student gets maximum benefit through various welfare schemes. Details about the welfare schemes are announced in the Morning Assembly and also displayed on the notice board. Mentor tries to counsel the students regarding any academic or personal problem faced by the student but in certain cases recommend the student to Counsellor of the Institution for professional counselling. The Student Welfare Department addresses and responds to all the queries both (academic and non-academic) of the students and also guides the students to avail various welfare schemes. Under student

welfare department, there is Counselling cell for professional counselling, Cell against Sexual Harassment, Readers' club, Health club, Anti Ragging cell, book Lost and Found Cell, Grievances Redressal Cell, Scholarships and Fee Concession committee and Stress Buster Club bank to facilitate the students. Institution also have career counselling and placement cell to guide the students for their future advancement. The objective of mentoring is to 1. Help new learners to settle in to the college/programme 2. Help to establish good communication between new learners and college staff and other Learners 3.To provide information about various student welfare schemes 4. Provide support for the individuals who might be isolated or lack support and self- confidence 5. Offer appropriate advice and guidance/ Counselling of any issue of the student 6. Help students to see the way ahead - progression and career opportunities 7. Give and receive constructive feedback about learning environment and infrastructure 8. Help mentees to manage time, plan and prioritise work, set goals and action plan, gain a better understanding of their studies. Training programmes like 'Mentoring the Mentors' are also held from time to time to prepare the faculty for mentoring. The students are encouraged to meet their mentors at regular intervals. During COVID lockdown period mentoring practice has played a great role. Mentors were constantly in touch with their mentees, asking about their mental and physical problems. They also kept on enquiring about any difficulty faced by students while shifting to online learning. The outcome was that students felt safe and confident.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website)

The college ensures optimal utilization of budget allocated for the maintenance and upkeep of the college infrastructure by holding regular meetings of various committees constituted to plan and monitor the projects to be taken up in a session. The Heads of the Departments prepare the proposals as per the requirements of their respective departments. Based on the need assessment equipment, furniture, labs, classroom, budget, provisions are optimally made. There is full-fledged infrastructure maintenance section headed by an Overseer for construction and maintenance of physical infrastructure. The Overseer is supported by a team of skilled workers. The various committees prepare the proposal and estimated cost of the planned maintenance and purchase of equipment and submit it to the head of the institution. The Principal, on the basis of the perspective development plan, proposes the infrastructural augmentation needs to the concerned authorities. The government agencies like UGC, DST and DBT sanction funds based on the requirements, student strength, and the nature of the academic programs offered by the institution. An effective monitoring system through various committees ensures the optimal utilization of budget allocated. The Overseer not only supervises construction but also takes care of maintenance and repair of buildings, water lines, electrical installations, equipment and other support services. The college has full time Administrative officer, Mechanic, Plumber, Electrician and Technician. The Administrative officer takes care of the regular repair and maintenance needs. The classrooms and seminarhalls are cleaned by support staff.Labs are maintained by lab attendants. Wherever the need arises, the concerned department writes application stating the nature of repair/ maintenance required. The applications by the concerned department are sent to the administration officer after being sanctioned for necessary action. The institution also employs security personnel who are on duty round the clock in the campus to ensure the safety and security of all estate and infrastructure. All the entry and exit points are under CCTV surveillance for safeguarding the assets. Computer Maintenance: As far as maintenance is concerned, Repair/ upgradation/purchase of hardware/software and software problems are taken care of by IT incharge and system administration teamcomprising of computer faculty and lab staff. Outside vendors are contacted for major repairs. Non-repairable systems are kept in store and disposed off after proper procedure of writing off and disposal of e-items. The institution purchases the new upgraded computer systems from time to time as per the needs. The internet and LAN facilities are also fully operational and are properly maintained and monitored by the staff of the server room. Library Maintenance - The routine maintenance

of the library is managed by the Librarian with the help of library assistants. The library is fully automated. All technical activities, catalogue and circulation are automated. There is a Library Advisory Committee whose major responsibilities are as follows: ? The committee formulates development plans and recommends facilities for implementation ? IQAC conducts a self-evaluative exercise for all the departments to draw a potential map of the strengths and weaknesses of the functioning of the college in various areas. Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Industry -Academia meet is held in each session. Also, continuous interaction is held with the industry for identification of gaps between industry aspirations and skills imparted to students, providing timely solutions to the management for bridging the gap. MOUs are signed or renewed with industry for skill component training of students and their placements and also for holding expert lectures. Industry representatives are members of each Board of Studies and are also consulted while framing syllabi as per various job roles at different levels. Students are sent for internships at various industries/ business houses. There are collaborations and linkages with industries and other noted institutions to organize seminars, workshops, field visits and use of library resources and laboratories.

Human Resource Management

There is proper mechanism of finding requirement of human resource and recruitment of staff and their promotion. IQAC members monitor and verify the scores claimed by teachers under different categories for new appointments and revision of their grades. Effective system of appraisal of performance of teachers is also in place based on details of lectures delivered, their research efforts, publications, organizing and attending conferences and academic programmes. It also encompasses details regarding various awards, honours and recognition conferred upon them and various administrative responsibilities held by them. Head of Departments and Deans monitor the teachers and office superintendent and administrative officer monitor the performance of nonteaching and support staff on the basis of punctuality, discipline and work effectiveness and provide feedback to Principal. There is professional code of conduct for staff that is uploaded on website. Orientation programs and faculty development programs are conducted. Notices are also circulated amongst faculty regarding any change in regulations or guidelines from university and UGC. In this year 545 books worth 5,23,106 rupees were purchased and 83 Journals were renewed, two more Jornals were added in Central Library. 100 e-Journals were also added. Apart from this 9 DVDs were added to library. Equipment worth Rs. 88.2 Lakh have been

purchased with 07 equipment like Fibre optic spectrometer, Trinocular compound microscope, Incubator orbital shaker and Bio UV visible with cost more than one lakh. Animation labs have been set up with latest software. IT infrastructure worth Rs. 5,32,762 was upgraded. In Central software a new module Learning Management System (LMS) has been added. With this software online classes were held during COVID-19. Existing labs of Cosmetology have been renovated and transformed into ultramodern lab named 'Sublime Art Studio'. Animation labs have been enriched with latest software. Labs of all departments have been upgraded with addition of new equipment under FIST grant. PG Departments of Music and Psychology have also been renovated. Central software has been upgraded with fully automation and on-line system for Students Management Module: Admissions, Student Certification Statistical Reports, Fee/ Cash Collection, Attendance, Examination, Financial Accounting, Payroll Management module, Establishment Module, Library Module, Alumni, Biometric for Teachers and Nonteaching staff, Feedback, Transportation, SMS Integration and hostel. College has also spent Rs. 51097650/- in maintenance of physical infrastructure.

Research and Development

College has very active research cell with that organises Research Forum from time to time to discuss research profile of different departments and inspire faculty to undertake quality

research. Research cell also organised midterm review meetings with external experts where teachers presented their project progress of Seed Money Research Projects allocated by online mode due to COVID-19. The Research Cell of the college also invited proposals for fresh Seed Money projects from teachers and students of all the departments and the presentations for these proposals were presented to the Research Board in online meetings in the presence of external projects. Research cell also guides faculty members in applying for major research projects and seminars grant e.g. under IMPRESS MHRD India. The research projects of three faculty members were selected by evaluating authority ICSSR New Delhi and they were invited to present their proposals. Faculty members are also motivated to write quality research papers in UGC listed Journals. To promote research, awards of excellence in research were given to teachers in senior and junior categories. For these nominations were invited from all the faculty members and assessment was made on the basis of their research score based on CAS guidelines. Award of Rs.10000 was given to each selected teacher. Teachers are also provided duty leave to attend seminar/conferences/FDPs/workshops and use lab/library in other institutions. College also have Hiccup free purchase policy to promote procurement of sophisticated research infrastructure and books journals. Internet and INFLIBNET services are provided to facilitate research. IQAC and Research cell also organise talks on Intellectual Property rights and research methodology. To promote innovation among students, Institution Innovation Cell (IIC) was set up as per the norms of the MHRD Innovation Cell (MIC) of Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India. The main aim of IIC at KMV will be to encourage young talented minds to participate in the entrepreneurial initiatives by providing them a perfect platform for showcasing their talents, working together as teams and to participate in various competitions.

Examination and Evaluation

Almost all the aspects of examination and evaluation are automated through software which takes care of all the

process from registration to downloading result. Due to COVID-19, all the examinations under autonomous system were held in online mode very successfully. Continuous Evaluation has been introduced in all the programmes. Internal assessment is based on class performance, mid semester tests and attendance of students. Evaluation system is made transparent. There is also provision to apply for revaluation of answer scripts of the final examinations for programmes under CE. College also have examination grievances redressal committee. Credit based evaluation system has been introduced in all B.Voc and M.Voc programmes. Teaching and Learning College has launched Learning Management System software where teachers upload lectures, notes, PPTs, assignments and on-line quiz. Apart from lectures, interclass quiz competitions, power point competitions, debates, class seminars, poster making competitions are held. Field/industrial visits, educational trips are also organised. Workshops are held for hands on training and extension lectures are organised where students interact with renowned resource persons. Science students perform extended experiments, demonstrations and undertake minor projects. Students participate in exhibitions, fairs inter-college competitions. Internships are made part of curriculum for majority of programmes for industrial exposure. Institution has set procedure to Curriculum Development review the existing curricula and get it approved through BOS meetings after discussions and taking feedback from faculty and various stake holders. 1. Conduction of Green audit in the campus. 2. Solid waste management is done by waste segregation, composting, disposing e- waste and green waste by proper mechanism. 3. Chemistry lab is installed with proper chemical disposing unit in form of specialized drums for collecting acid etc. 4. Cotton carry bag stitching and distribution is done by Fashion Design dept. to reduce use of plastic. 5. New building has been installed with rain water harvesting plants. 6. Under green audit, some plants which require less water have been identified and planted in the campus. Also the college established a well developed vertical garden in one of the section of its Botanical Garden. 7. On 1.9.2019, mass Tree Plantation drive was carried out under the state government's initiative 'Nanak Bagichi Program' to create environmental awareness by planting 300 saplings on 550th Parkash Purab of Guru Nanak Dev ji. 1. Solid waste management system is successfully installed in K.M.V. Campus and it includes segregation of biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste, composting, Incineration and disposal with the help of M.C.J. There are 100 dustbins have been placed all over campus. 2. Many trainings and campaigns are held to reduce, reuse and recycle material. In cotton bag making activity, was to motivate students and staff to reduce the use of throw away plastic carry bags. From newspapers, paper bags were prepared. From waste plastics material, pots for plants were made by students of Fashion Design department. 3. Chemistry labs are installed with proper chemical disposing unit in form of specialized drums for collecting acid etc. Chemistry department works on the lines of Green chemistry and follows set of principles that reduce or eliminate the use or generation of hazardous substances in the design, manufacture and application of chemical products. 4. Incinerators are installed to burn sanitary napkins. 5. About 100 saplings were planted in campus to celebrate Earth Day. 6. While selecting plants for plantation, more emphasis is placed on planting local, resilient varieties of plants that consume less water. 7. Disposal of the e-waste is done as per government regulations. 10. Paper free communication is done between office and staff. 11. Vehicle free and plastic free zones established in campus.
